### **Volume 10, Issue 2 August 22, 2011 Queenship of Mary**

Pius XII established this feast in 1954. But Mary's queenship has roots in Scripture. At the Annunciation, Gabriel announced that Mary's Son would receive the throne of David and rule forever. At the Visitation, Elizabeth calls Mary "mother of my Lord." As in all the mysteries of Mary's life, Mary is closely associated with Jesus: Her queenship is a share in Jesus' kingship. We can also recall that in the Old Testament the mother of the king has great influence in court. In the fourth century St. Ephrem called Mary "Lady" and "Queen." Later Church fathers and doctors continued to use the title. Hymns of the 11th to 13th centuries address Mary as queen: "Hail, Holy Queen," "Hail, Queen of Heaven," "Queen of Heaven." The Dominican rosary and the Franciscan crown as well as numerous invocations in Mary's litany celebrate her queenship. The feast is a logical follow-up to the Assumption and is now celebrated on the octave day of that feast. In his encyclical *To the Queen of Heaven*, Pius XII points out that Mary deserves the title because she is Mother of God, because she is closely associated as the New Eve with Jesus' redemptive work, because of her preeminent perfection and because of her intercessory power.

*"Let the entire body of the faithful pour forth persevering prayer to the Mother of God and Mother of men. Let them implore that she who aided the beginnings of the Church by her prayers may now, exalted as she is in heaven above all the saints and angels, intercede with her Son in the fellowship of all the saints. May she do so until all the peoples of the human family, whether they are honored with the name of Christian or whether they still do not know their Savior, are happily gathered together in peace and harmony into the one People of God, for the glory of the Most Holy and Undivided Trinity" (Dogmatic Constitution on the Church, 69).*

### **Marketing Minute #2**

Building on Marketing Minute #1, *Telling Good News Stories*, I came across this editorial on May 19, 2011, in The Plain Dealer. Kevin O'Brien, deputy editorial page editor, wrote this column about the power of a small Catholic college to influence its students and parents. Mr. O'Brien speaks of the Catholic school mission's power for good. After describing his, his wife's and older children's avoidance of college graduation, he writes that they decided to attend their fourth child's graduation ceremony because she loved the school and her classmates so much. He writes:

“There was a time...when the broadly understood purpose of a university education was to impart to good, young minds the wisdom and knowledge of the best thinkers the world has produced. At colleges with religious underpinnings, that mission was amplified by the effort to impart a sense of individual place and purpose in God’s creation. The questions had correct answers, and those answers were rooted in an appreciation of what is good and virtuous and beautiful and blessed...You can feel the difference just by taking a walk through the campus. You can see it in the way students act toward one another. You certainly can see it in the way they dress. You can hear it when they talk about why they’re there and what they hope to do once they move on. You can hear it when they talk about their professors and their mentors on the faculty. “They love us,” my daughter explained. But first and foremost, they love God. And therein lies the difference.”

### **OCEA Convention**

#### *DATES AND LOCATION*

The 2011 Ohio Catholic Education Association (OCEA) Convention will take place Monday and Tuesday, October 3-4, 2011 in Columbus, Ohio at the Hyatt Regency and the Greater Columbus Convention Center.

#### *REGISTRATION*

Online registration for the OCEA Convention will be available at this site beginning on August 1, 2011.

*The deadline for online registration for the Convention is September 23, 2011.*

The registration fee remains at its 2005 rate: \$100 per person.

#### *HOTEL RESERVATIONS*

*September 9<sup>th</sup>* is the cutoff for online hotel reservations at OCEA rates at participating hotels. Hotel reservations have come in beyond expectation. The Hyatt Regency (Convention Center Hotel) still has rooms available for persons staying Sunday night ONLY.

### **Emergency Fund Clarification**

Emergency Funding is available to families who are involved in a major family crisis and need immediate assistance. A crisis situation is a death of a spouse, loss of employment, separation or divorce, terminal illness, etc., and unexpected situations that impact a family during the current school year. The Emergency Fund is only used during the summer to assist families with unpaid balances from the previous school year that meet the criteria of a crisis situation. The funds are *not to anticipate* what a family believes “*might happen*.”

Principals, Business Managers and Secretaries, please do not refer parents to Peggy Lipinski, Assistant Grants Administrator for any other reason than an Emergency Fund situation.

Emergency Fund applications are distributed in late October.

### **My So-Called Enemy**

### **The U.S. Department of Education to Launch the Green Ribbon Schools Recognition Program**

The U.S. Department of Education in collaboration with the Environmental Protection Agency and the White House Council on Environmental Quality will launch the Green Ribbon Schools (ED-GRS) recognition program this fall with awardees being named in the spring of 2012. The purpose of the program is to provide incentive for schools to embody energy, cost, health and environmentally sustainable learning spaces and education as they boost overall health, productivity and academic achievement. While the criteria are not firmly established yet, it is expected that the program will run similarly to the Blue Ribbon program. Schools achieving the prestigious status of being named Green Ribbon Schools will demonstrate success in the following three pillars.

- Environmental Impact and Energy Conservation
- Healthy School Environment for Students and Faculty
- Environmentally Sustainable Education Programs

### **Youth Rally and Mass for Life to be held on January 23<sup>rd</sup> in Washington, D.C.**

On January 23<sup>rd</sup> the Archdiocese of Washington, D.C. will host the Rally and Mass for Life on the anniversary of the Roe v. Wade decision. In his August 12<sup>th</sup> letter to pastors, school administrators, youth ministers, campus ministers and theology teachers, Bishop Richard Lennon said, "The Rally and Mass for Life give testimony to our Catholic youth's devotion to the Gospel of Life and love for the Church."

The Youth Rally and Mass for Life will be held on January 23<sup>rd</sup> at the Verizon Center and the D.C. Armory. The Archdiocese of Washington has requested that all Cleveland diocesan groups participating in this event reserve their tickets for this event through one diocesan office, for us, the Office of Catholic Education. Schools or groups in the Cleveland Diocese that wish to participate, should delegate one person to order all tickets for the school or group participating. The tickets can be ordered by completing the information requested online at <http://www.oces.org/rally4life>. *The deadline for Cleveland Diocesan groups to order tickets is Friday, September 2, 2011.* Once tickets are received in the diocese, they will be distributed to the groups placing orders by the deadline. While the Archdiocese of Washington encourages participation, it cannot guarantee that there will be sufficient seating for all those requesting tickets.

### **2012 Catholic Relief Services, Operation Rice Bowl Appeal, and CCHD Free Promotional Materials Request**

Deacon Rocky Ortiz, Diocesan Catholic Campaign for Human Development and Catholic Relief Services Director, thanks you on behalf of Bishop Richard G. Lennon and asks that you extend sincere appreciation to your staff and students for the support given to CCHD, CRS, and Operation Rice Bowl. Your help is invaluable in light of the major disasters worldwide and in the U.S. this year. The USCCB Office of Collections has created a new Web-based system for managing the promotion aspects of their national collections. One of the changes instituted is that they are only accepting parish information and promotional materials requests during the current three-month summer period.

You have received a Promotional Materials Request Form for all three collections in your folder at the Bishop's Convocation. ### **Pupil Activity Permits (High Schools)**

The state requires that "before hiring any individual, whether licensed or unlicensed, to direct, supervise, or coach any program that involves athletics, routine or regular physical activity, or health and safety considerations, the hiring authority shall assure that the individual has obtained a Pupil Activity Permit issued by the State Board..." (AC3301-27-01 [C]).

Section (D) of the same rule makes clear that whether the program requires a permit (i.e., involves athletics, routine or regular physical activity, or health and safety considerations) is "determined by the SCHOOL."

Therefore:

1. Not every extra-curricular activity's moderator needs a permit. If the school believes the activity/program (e.g., "In the Know," chess club, etc.) doesn't meet the above definition, then no permit is needed;
2. If the activity/program requires a permit, then the individual needs up-to-date first aid/CPR as indicated on the ODE's application form;
3. OHSAA's rules trump for coaches who are under their rules. Their requirements include completion of the new "Fundamentals of Coaching" course;
4. The principal's signature on the application for a Pupil Activity Permit NO LONGER IS ACCEPTABLE. The person in the diocese who is approved by ODE to sign applications for other licenses is the person whose signature must be on the application form for a Pupil Activity Permit. In the Diocese of Cleveland, the person is the **Superintendent of Schools/official designee**.
5. The permit remains a 3-year (renewable) credential.

### September 20 Webinar on Physician-Assisted Suicide

Bishop Lennon invites all to participate in an important webinar on Physician-Assisted Suicide sponsored by the Offices of Disability Ministry, Disability Services, and Pro Life. This is a topic

that impacts all of our ministries and stands as a challenge against our belief in the dignity of every human life at every phase of life.

The webinar entitled, "Threats to the Lives of Persons with Disability: Part II: Physician-Assisted Suicide," will be presented by USCCB Pro Life and the National Partnership on Disabilities. Part I was offered in May regarding pre-natal diagnosis of disability.

This webinar will be available in our diocese at four locations: The Hispanic Senior Center at St. Augustine Towers in Cleveland, St. Julie Billiart Parish in North Ridgeville, Center for Pastoral Leadership in Wickliffe, and Holy Martyrs Parish in Medina.
